Disaster Health Information Sources: The Basics

Health Information Resources for CBRNE (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosives)

This class provides an overview of the concepts of CBRNE, including a review of National Library of Medicine resources and tools that provide health-related information to support planning, response, and recovery from the effects of these potential hazards. This course is **free**, however you must set up an account.

Occupational Health in Developing Countries



From the University of Bergen. This free online 6-weeks course provides an introduction to occupational health – a part of public health that is neglected in many developing countries, where industrial activity is increasing, but the health and safety of workers is hardly discussed. The course will teach you basic knowledge of occupational health and how to prevent the development of diseases and injuries, which are caused by working conditions in developing countries. **Starts Oct 17, 2016.**

After the course, you will understand:

- the basic concepts of occupational health;
- the tasks and structure of occupational health services:
- the most important risk factors for illness and injuries at workplaces globally;
- the major occupational diseases;
- the different steps in risk assessment at

the workplace;

- the association between workplace exposure and health effects;
- the main steps in preventing exposure to health hazards in the work environment.

Palliative care: Making it work



Free online course from the University of Lancaster. Over three weeks, you will be introduced to the concept of palliative care and how it can be integrated with other types of care. The course will feature examples of where this has been done well.

Learn how palliative care is managed across Europe. Drawing on research from the EU funded project InSup-C, you will learn how integrated palliative care is managed across five European countries. It will include international guest speakers to provide real-life examples of best practice in delivering integrated palliative care. **Starts Oct 17, 2016.**

Medicines Adherence: Supporting Patients with Their Treatment



Starts October 24, 2016. This two week course is designed for pharmacists, doctors, nurses and other health-

care professionals with a role or interest in supporting patients with long-term conditions. They have invited a range of inspirational healthcare professionals, researchers and clinical academics from across King's College London's Institute

of Pharmaceutical Science and the Pharmaceutical Clinical Academic Group at King's Health Partners to contribute to this course. You will be able to immerse yourself in the engaging video material, scenarios and discussions to explore the challenges of medicines non-adherence, factors that may influence patient medicines use and approaches that can be used to effectively engage patients in patient-centred consultations about self-managing medicines.

This course is delivered in bite-sized sections, so you will be able to enhance your own understanding of medicines adherence and, importantly, gain increasing awareness of where in your own day-to-day consultations you can apply these techniques and approaches to better support patient self-management of medicines and effect behaviour change.

By the end of this two week course, learners will have developed their understanding, and reflected upon their own clinical practice and consultation skills, in order to:

- 1) Identify patients who may be having problems with their medicines
- 2) Employ strategies to support these patients with the use of their medicines.

The learning materials have been designed to take approximately 1-2 hours per week to complete.

eHealth: Combining Psychology, Technology and Health



Starts November 7, 2016. In this free 6-week

online course, they will provide you with insight into the domain of eHealth, describe methods to develop eHealth, and explain

theories that enable behaviour change and facilitate implementation. You will also understand how eHealth technologies are developed and used in practice, by means of a variety of case studies, assignments and examples.

This course pays attention to the perspectives of the eHealth developers, patients, healthcare professionals and healthy people who want to improve or maintain their health and wellbeing.

These perspectives are applied to the three main topics of this course:

- During Weeks 1 and 2, we will introduce eHealth and show you how eHealth technologies are used to enable or improve selfcare and prevention, supportive care, and societal health:
- Weeks 3 and 4 will focus on design. You will learn how to design eHealth that fits the user and the context, and is able to seduce or support people into changing their behavior:
- Weeks 5 and 6 will focus on the diffusion and evaluation of eHealth technologies within the intended context, and among users and other relevant stakeholders.

After finishing this course, you will have new knowledge about eHealth, acquired relevant eHealth skills, and gained insight into the use of eHealth in practice.
