## Spotlight on: Resources on Grants and Funding



Grants are non-repayable funds or products disbursed by one party (grant makers), often a government department, corporation, foundation or trust, to a recipient, often (but not always) a nonprofit entity, educational institution, business or an individual. In order to receive a grant, some form of "Grant Writing" often referred to as either a proposal or an application is required. The grant writing process involves an applicant submitting a proposal (or submission) to a potential funder, either on the applicant's own initiative or in response to a Request for Proposal from the funder. *From Wikipedia, [https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Grant\\_\(money\)](https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Grant_(money))*

## National Institutes of Health. Grants and Funding



The National Institutes of Health (NIH), part of the United States Department of Health & Human Services, is the primary U.S. Federal agency that conducts and supports medical research. The 27 Institutes and Centers (ICs) of NIH provide leadership and financial support to researchers both inside and outside the United States. Approximately 80% of NIH funding goes to support research grants, including grants to foreign organizations. Many of the ICs have international programs/collaborations that can be linked to from their homepages.

This page provides information specifically for foreign applicants and grantees. Applications for research grant support from foreign organizations are treated as if they were applications from domestic organizations. There are a few exceptions which are highlighted on this page. This page also provides links to important information for foreign applicants as they consider and prepare applications and administer grant awards.

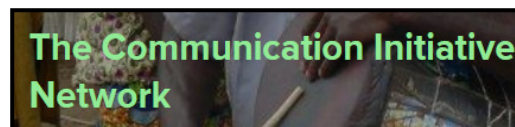
